Placement objective and volunteer role and responsibilities	As the Advocacy Advisor based in Phnom Penh, Cambodia, you will support AVSF Cambodia in building the capacity of their staff and the staff of AVSF's local partner organizations (CACA, READA, FCFD, PMUAC) to identify, establish protocols, and ensure effective implementation of advocacy action. You will hear from farmers, Agriculture Cooperatives (ACs), Agriculture Cooperative Unions (ACUs) and complete an evidence-based study, both within the organization and at the partner level.  As part of your role, you will:  Share best practices, resources, and tools to identify the advocacy theme in collaboration with AVSF and its partner organizations.  Conduct training sessions for staff, partners, and share best practices in advocacy strategy and implementation within the organization.  Support in identifying and mapping potential partners  Assist in advocacy action implementation, monitoring, and evaluation.  Assist in drafting progress reports on advocacy action implementation.  Ensure an environmental and sustainability climate action lens is applied throughout the placement by integrating climate friendly solutions and activities where applicable during the placement.  Promote human rights by promoting inclusive activities and ensuring the rights of marginalized individuals are protected where applicable during the placement. ## **Support Package**

VWB offers you an incredible experience to take part in an international volunteer experience where you will expand your personal and professional skills while contributing to global development. VWB commits to supporting you throughout your volunteer journey and will cover the majority of the costs involved in being an overseas volunteer, including:

- Travel and accommodation for the pre-departure training course in Ottawa
- In-country orientation upon arrival in country of placement
- Return airfare to placement country
- Visa/permit costs
- The cost of required for vaccinations and anti-malarial medication
- Overseas emergency travel health insurance
- A monthly living allowance (MLA) that will be paid into the volunteer's bank account in Canada. The MLA is designed to be sufficient to cover simple housing, basic food requirements, and other typical monthly living expenses.

- Debrief after the placement

In the global south, more than 90 per cent of food animals are raised by subsistence farmers yet these small-scale livestock producers, the majority of whom are women, have very limited access to quality and affordable animal health services. Volunteers Engaged in Gender Responsive Technical Solutions (VETS) is a seven-year (2020 to 2028) Volunteer Cooperation Program funded by Global Affairs Canada. VETS will engage 190 volunteers who will support local partner organizations in Ghana, Kenya, Lao PDR and Cambodia. Volunteers will help create integrated animal health systems to increase the livelihoods and household nutrition of small-scale farmers.

The VETS program utilizes the skills of volunteers to build local partner capacity to support community members, primarily women, to reduce poverty. Through improved production of livestock and crops, volunteers help improve family income and nutrition. The VETS program is built around the One Health concept, which recognizes that the health of people, animals, and the natural environment are interconnected. This project promotes the production of more and better food and increased incomes from livestock, all the while promoting land rehabilitation and conservation for sustainable development.
